#### Exhibit runs from May 11–Aug. 25

The Vikings have been the victims of "bad press." English and Irish histories have tended to focus on one limited and negative aspect - the early raiding activities. The image of Vikings as horned, bloodthirsty barbarians has been repeated in history texts of English-speaking countries such as Canada and the United States. However, archaeological work has helped to paint an entirely different picture. A more accurate representation of Vikings as mariners, colonizers, merchants and skilled craftspeople has emerged

### Black History Exhibit Opens August 3, 2002

Black settlers have lived in Grey County since the region opened for non-Native settlement in the 1830s. Some were escaped slaves; others were freemen. All contributed to the growth and development of Grey County, though the establishment of farms, businesses and social organizations.

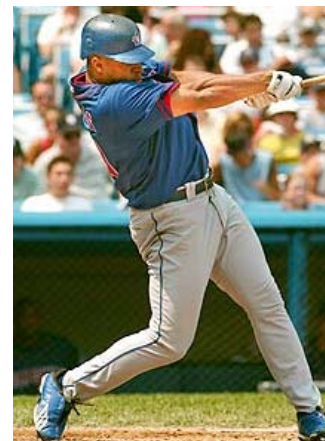
## Fine Session Highlights
